




Quivira Up-dates: Publications

This year is already going full speed. We have two new publications that will soon be available on our website.

- <u>Bullseye! Targeting Your Rangeland Health Objectives</u> by Kirk Gadzia and Todd Graham.
- A Good Road Lies Easy on the Land...Water Harvesting from Low-Standard Rural Roads by Bill Zeedyk. (Hard copies of the book will be available by the end of April.)





Also, our Field Guides have been updated and reprinted in COLOR! We now have available the 2nd edition, of Introduction to Erosion Control by Bill Zeedyk and Jan-Willem Jansens and the 3rd edition of An Introduction to Induced Meandering: A Method for Restoring Stability to Incised Stream Channels by Bill Zeedyk. We are currently updating our website (www.quiviraco-alition.org) and it is scheduled to be on-line by the end of June.

Volunteer Events:

This year we are focusing our restoration efforts and workshop events on two rivers, Cedro and Comanche Creeks.

Cedro Creek is part of an EPA Wet Meadow Restoration Grant and we will be restoring about 9 miles of the creek over a 3 year period. Cedro Creek is located on south 337 in Tijeras Canyon east of Albuquerque. We will be holding a public work day on Earth Day, April 22, to restore a reach located close to the Sandia Ranger Station. We call this our X-Stream Makeover project that also involves local school children who have come out to help make a difference on Cedro Creek!

Our work on **Comanche Creek** will continue this summer. We will be finishing the elk-exclosures and installing more vanes to protect eroding banks along the lower and middle reaches of Comanche. We have two public workshop dates to choose from: Friday-Saturday, July 7-8 and Saturday-Sunday July, 15-16. We accomplished so much last year and hope to do the same in 2006. The New Ranch Network (NRN) Small Grants Program

The NRN Small Grants Program provides assistance to landowners, associations and communities in making changes through collaboration. The grants are primarily to support education and outreach activities. The Small Grants Program is a pilot effort to establish the need for and potential effectiveness of providing small grants to individuals and communities for education and planning assistance. The current funding level is modest but hopefully will grow over time as successes accumulate. Listed below are examples of the types of activities that can be supported by the NRN Small Grants Program.

- **⊃** Hire a *Coach* to assist in goal-setting for a community.
- **⊃** Hire a *Mentor* to work with a permittee or grazing association.
- → Hire a *Specialist* to assist with a particular community need.
- Organize and conduct:
 - ♦ a planned grazing seminar
 - ♦ a low stress livestock handling clinic
 - ♦ herder training
 - ◊ a range school for a local community
 - ♦ a tour of a regional ranch
 - ♦ range health workshops
 - ♦ monitoring workshops
 - ♦ riparian restoration workshops
- **⊃** Provide support for GIS maps or related resource planning management support.
- ➡ Link community members to specialized resources.

The basic criteria forproject funding are:

- \$ The project or activity involves a community that has a Forest Ranger District and is dependent on National Forest System lands for economic & community stability.
- \$ Has a connection with the Public Service Company of New Mexico (PNM) e.g., through a right of way.
- \$ Projects require a 1:1 cash or in-kind match. Travel to and participation in workshops or events does not count for match.

Grants range in size from \$1,000 to \$5,000.

Preference will be given to applications that show the greatest potential for leveraging the initial grant into larger projects or programs.
